

CHAIRPERSON'S REPORT

2022 proved to be yet another good year for golf in Western Australia, as we continued to manage our way out of the COVID pandemic. Club Membership numbers were again above past expectations, leaving many Clubs with the task of not so much attracting new Members but, instead, focusing on retaining the ones they have gained – and managing the wear and tear on their golf courses!

For me, notable highlights in 2022 include: -

- Club membership increased by 2.2% to 35,444 with Metropolitan and Public Club Membership increasing by 1.8%, and 6.4% respectively.
 Country Club total membership showed a marginal increase of 11 members.
- Men's club membership increased by just under 1% with male membership in Metropolitan clubs increasing by 1.7% and Public Clubs by 1.3%.
 However, male membership in country clubs had a small decrease of 0.6%. These numbers, particularly in metropolitan and larger country clubs, no doubt reflect the current close-to-full capacity that exists for male membership given membership increases in recent years.
- Of great encouragement was an increase in female membership of 7.7%. This was most evident in Public Clubs with a massive increase of 30%, whilst metropolitan and country female membership

increased by 2.5% and 2.6% respectively. Whilst we only have one Suburban Club - Chequers GC - their membership numbers showed an increase of 18.7% for men and 24% for women. These significant increases in female membership are indeed encouraging and hopefully reflective of a growing awareness for clubs to offer attractive programs for new female golfers that also address the negative perceptions of our game. In last year's report I stated that Growing our Game - and especially the participation of women and girls still remains fundamental to the Board of GolfWA and we will continue to invest heavily in this aspect of our programs. These membership numbers reinforce our position.

- Junior membership for both boys and girls increased for a third consecutive year, with boys membership up 7.4% and girls by 5.4%, with the largest increase being in metropolitan clubs of 12.4%.
- Our Participation Programs
 continued to go from strength to
 strength. Particularly pleasing is the
 number of schools that we deliver
 MyGolf into, and the increase in
 programs being conducted
 regionally as a result of our Regional
 Servicing Grant from the Department
 of Local Government, Sport and
 Cultural Industries. Further details on

Our High Performance athletes had plenty of highlights as they proved themselves on the national and international stage: –

- Kirsten Rudgeley won the inaugural WPGA 'The Athena' event in February, which comprised of skills challenges followed by 5-hole and 3-hole match play. She followed this up with a win at the Avondale Amateur. Kirsten also won the right to play in the Augusta National Women's Amateur in the US, where she finished T8. This was followed by a host of amateur and professional events, both interstate and internationally. Kirsten turned professional in December 2022 at the Australian Women's Open and we wish her well in her future golfing journey having secured her card for the Ladies European Tour.
- Abbie Teasdale had a wonderful year, winning the Riversdale Amateur in Victoria and then travelling to the UK to win the English Women's Amateur in June. Abbie also won the Bowra & O'Dea Women's Classic at Royal Fremantle.
- Connor McKinney had a stellar year with three event wins. His first came at the South Australia Amateur Classic, which he won in a playoff. This was followed by the Australian Amateur at Cranbourne Golf Club, Victoria, again in a playoff. His third was at the 'Home of Golf', St Andrews, where he won the St Andrews Links Trophy with fellow High Performance athlete Adam Brady two shots behind.

- Hayden Hopewell won the Terry Gale Cup (Leading Amateur) at the 2021 WA Open (held in 2022).
- Joe Buttress won three Junior Order of Merit events (Tasmanian Junior, Tasmanian Masters and Victorian Junior) to become the 2022 Australian Junior Order of Merit Champion.
- Sheridan Clancy won the TPS Murray River Junior Girls Championship; and Isabella Leniartek won the Jack Newton International Junior Classic Sub Junior.
- Hayden Hopewell, Connor McKinney, Kirsten Rudgeley and Maddison Hinson-Tolchard represented Australia in the World Amateur Teams Championship.


Professionally, WA golfers also achieved some outstanding results: -

 Minjee Lee won her second major of her career in June at the US Women's Open, cementing her standing as one of the leading female players in the world. She also won the Cognizant Founders Cup; finished 2nd in the **HSBC** Women's World Championship and the KPMG US PGA Championship; and T4 in the Open Championship. On top of those, she was the winner of the Rolex Annika Major Award and the Aon Risk Reward Challenge at the end of the 2022 LPGA season. Combined with all her other achievements, Minjee finished 2022 at No. 3 in the world.

- Min Woo Lee had another excellent year, finishing with three top-10s on the DP World Tour before coming home towards the end of the year to finish T4 and 3rd in the Australian PGA and Australian Open respectively.
- Hannah Green enjoyed a strong year with nine top-10 finishes on the LPGA Tour before being in contention to win the Australian Women's Open on the last day, before eventually finishing 3rd. Hannah also put herself in the record books as the first woman to win a professional, fulllength mixed-gender tournament, claiming the \$200,000 TPS Murray River by four shots.
- Jason Scrivener had a solid year on the DP World Tour, whilst Whitney Hillier posted four top-10 finishes on the WPGA Tour at the start of the year, as well as five top-10 finishes on the Ladies European Tour throughout 2022.
- Connor McKinney and Hayden
 Hopewell both turned professional
 in December 2022, with both
 making the cuts at the Australian
 PGA Championship and Australian
 Open. As with Kirsten, we wish
 both Connor and Hayden the very
 best in professional ranks. >

The WA Golf Foundation continues to be funded both by the on-going generosity of Members at our Metropolitan Clubs via the "Will You Chip In" Program - and by a group of eight generous individuals who have made a five-year commitment to provide significant funding to the WAGF. Consequently, the Foundation has been able to provide funding into a range of game development programs across the State. Further details can be found in this Annual Report. I thank GolfWA Deputy Chairman Ian Crockett for his excellent work with regard to this initiative, and for his Chairmanship of the Foundation in general.

The work of our Club Health Committee continued to bring rewards in both the Metropolitan area and in the Regions and we are most appreciative of the great work done by our Regional Support Officers in this regard. We continue to see stronger and mutually beneficial relationships being developed between our Country and Metropolitan Clubs through our Buddy Club initiative in this regard and we urge all of our Members – both Metropolitan and Regional – to get involved in this program.

GolfWA, through the Club Health Committee, again delivered some professional development opportunities to our Members in 2022, both regionally and in the metropolitan area, particularly around matters of Governance. The participants in this initiative were most appreciative of this opportunity and it will remain an important budget inclusion in 2023. This is just one of the recent additions to GolfWA's Membership proposition. I thank Jane

Crane for her continued excellent work as the Chairperson of this Committee.

Kay Lane, Brian O'Meara and Max Hannah again provided invaluable input to the Board in 2022 in the area of Golf Honours. Their comprehensive research this year resulted in recognition at the SportWest Awards of Ritchie Smith as Coach of the Year and of Minjee Lee as a finalist in the Sports Star of the Year Award for 2021, which was ultimately awarded in 2022. I thank them again for their work in ensuring leading contributors to our great game get the recognition they deserve.

The Golf Advisory Panel had a slow start to the year as the Board awaited the finalisation of the Australian Golf Strategy, which would then enable completion of the GolfWA Strategic Plan. We were aware that the new Australian Golf Strategy would present many opportunities for the growth and development of our game and that many of these opportunities would require input from the Panel. Consequently, the Panel has commenced work on the substantial strategic piece around the engagement of the significant percentage of golfers who are not members of Clubs, as well as rationalisation of our District structures and the development of engagement strategies with Local and State Government.

I am excited about what the Panel will bring to the Board in 2023, on the back of our new Strategic Plan that supports the ground-breaking Australian Golf Strategy. Again I thank Justin Davies

for taking on the challenging role as the Chairperson of the Golf Advisory Panel. The remit of this Panel has been developed and we expect that it will really come into its own in 2023 on the back of the renewed Strategic Plan.

Our Governance Committee continued to provide valuable advice to the Board on matters surrounding risk, our constitution, financial performance and ethical processes. Further sound work was undertaken in bolstering the oversight of our Board responsibilities in 2022 and we look forward to the continued guidance to the Board that this Committee brings. I thank Jodie Meadows for her excellent work in again chairing this Committee.

The new Australian Golf Strategy – to which GolfWA (along with all the Golf Australia Member Associations) had the opportunity to make a significant contribution – represents a paradigm shift in thinking around the future and shape of golf in Australia. Importantly, Golf Australia, the PGA of Australia and the WPGA of Australia have forged an extremely important and collaborative alignment with each body now engaged in a unified manner towards seeing significant growth in our game.

GolfWA is fully committed to the Australian Golf Strategy and we have now finalised the GolfWA 2022-2025 Strategy, ensuring complete alignment. This presents many exciting opportunities for this Board and we look forward to responding positively to them in 2023.

With regard to the WA Open Tournament, 2022 was indeed an unusual year. As a consequence of travel restrictions into WA, the 97th running of the event was postponed twice in 2021 and ultimately rescheduled to April 2022 and played at Royal Fremantle Golf Club. Our 2022 event was then held at The Western Australian Golf Club in October.

Our long-term partner Nexus Advisernet committed to support both of these events in 2022 and we thank them, as always, for their wonderful support. Both Royal Fremantle and The Western Australian Golf Clubs presented their courses and their hospitality offerings at a very high level and we thank them for giving us the opportunity to showcase golf through their Clubs. The 2022 Open was also the first time we have been able to offer a substantial part of our tournament to TV viewers. This was received very positively and will form a significant part of our event in 2023.

The Board of GolfWA remains well balanced, committed and dedicated to the Strategic Plan. The Board very much appreciates the continued support of our Member Clubs and Districts (through their GolfWA delegates) and we are firmly of the view that this support has contributed significantly to the stability of this current Board.

We welcomed two new Board Members in Kellie Benda and Karen Caddy in 2022 and they have brought immediate and positive benefits to our already strong Board. Jodie Meadows' increased work commitments meant that she could no longer sustain her position on the Board. We are extremely grateful to have had the opportunity to work with Jodie over

the past three years and also that she has been able to stay with us as the Chairperson of our Governance Committee.

Our Chief Executive Gary Thomas continues to enhance his credentials as an outstanding Sport Administrator. His skills in liaising with our clubs and facilities, various State Government departments, our sponsors and partners, Golf Australia and other stakeholders, as well as his support to our Board, Committees and staff, has been first class. Gary's breakdown of GolfWA's finances, staffing and other executive matters is contained elsewhere in this report.

We met with both Golf Australia and our counterparts in all of the States and Territories on a regular basis throughout 2022 and again this has proven valuable and fruitful across the board. The relationships across Australia remain strong, which has enabled us to reopen dialogue with Golf Australia around their Australian Golf Service Provision arrangements. As things stand, there is some likelihood that some agreement around this may be reached in 2023. In the meantime, the strong spirit of collaboration has cemented alignment of our behaviours.

Our volunteers – the lifeblood of all notfor-profit organisations – are always fabulous with their skilful and selfless dedication to our sport. In 2022 they were again extraordinary and their great support to our game has reduced the load on our Board, our staff and certainly our Chairperson! On that note, I convey, as always, my personal appreciation to all of golf's volunteers – which includes my colleagues on the GolfWA Board and members of the various Committees. I convey the same to our terrific staff for their support and their ongoing dedication and professionalism.

We trust the involvement of our Member Clubs' vast array of volunteers and staff has been enjoyable and fulfilling and that they will remain involved with your Clubs and GolfWA for years to come.

In the meantime, we look forward to your continued support as we promote both our own and the National Strategy's Participation, Club Health (Grow our Core), High Performance and other programs and initiatives. We trust that we will continue to deliver even more value back to you in return.

GolfWA will always welcome constructive feedback and we ask that you feel completely free to continue to provide this to us at any time.

2022 arrived and it would be fair to say we were all hoping to see the end of the pandemic. However, it continued to impact the community for a few more months and in turn golf to some degree. However, thankfully we are now back to operating normally and I take this opportunity to thank and congratulate our clubs and facilities on the challenges they have faced over the preceding two years and the professional manner in which they dealt with those challenges.

Unfortunately, the start of 2022 also saw WA impacted by bushfires and in the case of the golfing community, Bridgetown and Jerramungup Golf Clubs were badly affected. A GolfWA fundraising campaign saw over \$30,000 donated to the clubs whilst many other golf clubs and individuals donated directly in cash and product. I thank all those who made a contribution.

The Chair has referenced the National Strategy for Australian Golf and its key pillars of Telling our Story Better, Attracting New Golfers and Grow our Core. For me, Telling our Story Better is crucial and something as an industry we can greatly improve on. It is up to all of us to share our love of the sport and attract new people to it. Whilst we all know that golf has experienced considerable growth through the pandemic, we have a great opportunity to continue that momentum and to encourage more Western Australians to play more golf, be it on the course, at a driving range or even mini golf.

One of the key components arising out of the National Strategy is the Women's and Girls Engagement Strategy, which is the evolvement of Vision 2025. Part of that strategy is the R&A's Women in Golf Charter and I am delighted to advise that Gosnells Golf Club became the first WA signatory to this charter in late 2022. Another dozen clubs have expressed their desire to become signatories and I anticipate that many of these will come to fruition in early 2023.




Participation rates

Whilst the previous two years showed an increase in Golflink rounds played, 2022 saw a small decrease of 8,390 rounds (0.8%). This decrease was not unexpected and was seen in both metropolitan and regional areas, no doubt reflective of golfers being

able to travel interstate and overseas more openly in 2022 since the relaxation of COVID travel rules. However, what is encouraging from an industry perspective is the number of rounds is still significantly higher than the prepandemic numbers of 2019.

GolfWA recorded a small surplus of \$44,988 as opposed to a budgeted deficit of \$233,521. Given the impact of having two WA Opens in the one year, this is a pleasing result, especially given a return to a full suite of programs, events and services compared to the previous two years. WA GOLF FOUNDATION

In 2022 the number of programs funded by the Foundation was relatively small compared to previous years with only 10 programs approved. However, these grants totalled just under \$84K as many of the programs were for 6-12 months duration. This brings the total number of approved funded programs to 165 since the Foundation's inception with total funding pledged/paid since inception now amounting to \$775K.

Most of the programs funded in 2022 were continuing funding for very strong programs such as Country Coaching at over 20 clubs conducted by Rob Farley; Mark Tibbles' Ready Steady Golf program for those with disabilities; and the Blind Golf program. New programs at Jurien Bay Golf Club and Pinjarra Golf Club were also funded.

As reported last year both the WA Golf Foundation and GolfWA contributed

financially to the Australian Golf
Foundation (along with all other state
and national golfing bodies) to help fund
the AGF's Junior Girls Scholarship
Program. In 2022 both bodies doubled
their commitment to this program by
contributing \$10,000 each as did other
bodies around the country. This program
has been a huge success with 909 girls
being granted scholarships across the
country in its first two years.

The Trustees again extend their appreciation to all those Clubs and individual members who participated in the 'Will You Chip In' program, as well as donating in other forms to make the work of the Foundation possible.

The Trustees would also like to thank the WA PGA office who held a Charity Day in November with just under \$10K being raised and going to the WA Golf Foundation.

Rules, Handicapping and Amateur Status

As we moved through 2022 the well-documented growth in all ages playing golf and joining golf clubs, largely prompted by the COVID pandemic, continued to maintain the pressure on golf course timesheets and golf facilities.

While there were not any significant amendments to the Rules of Golf in 2022, changes to Rules of Amateur Status were introduced on 1 January, which can be found on the Golf Australia website (www.golf.org.au/amateurstatus). The main changes regarded prize money that can now be accepted at scratch amateur events; and prize money/trophy limits only exist for "tee-to-hole" events, not events such as a long drive competition; together with reduction in the waiting time for reinstatement of amateur status. All the changes are quite logical and in keeping with the modernisation of the rules that commenced back in 2019.

Reinstatement of amateur status was provided to seven professionals following the normal guidelines as provided by the R&A and Golf Australia.

GolfWA continues to offer formal or informal rules sessions, both in person and online, to all clubs and their members, and this will always be a focus to ensure that we can all enjoy the game in a fair and equitable way. There are two levels of accreditation in rules that are readily available, with an entry-level online Level 1 course and a more detailed Level 2 course that provides for those members, committees or staff who want to increase their rules knowledge.

A massive thank you to our volunteer GolfWA Rules Officials that included Bill Kinsella, Julie Lepp, Maura Morrissey, Jonathan Nassim, Graeme Parsons, Damien Todorovic and Shane Weir. The support, expertise and time that these dedicated individuals provided to referee and assist in general at major events and pennants throughout the year was outstanding.

Course Rating

2022 simply continued the growth in queries and requests from previous years to rate all tees for all genders, together with shorter tees that are targeted at older and new golfers where the length of holes may have a negative impact on them playing this wonderful game.

In addition, a significant number of queries throughout the year were for re-rating for significant changes to holes, renovations and shorter tees. A total of 27 clubs, including five country clubs, were provided with ratings adjustments relevant to their requests.





The year commenced with Junior Pennants with participants from 13 different clubs competing over five rounds, including juniors from a composite team from South West clubs.

2022 saw Joondalup taking out the Men's Division One pennant for the second year in a row and Mount Lawley taking the win in Women's Division One.

The Amateur Championships of Western Australia had a quality field compete over the 36-hole qualifying at Mount Lawley Golf Club, with Kathryn Norris (Mandurah) taking home the Women's Medallist honours. Ryan Peake (Lakelands) shot a two-under total to claim the Men's Medallist title. The match play rounds produced some outstanding matches, with Celine Chen (Joondalup) beating clubmate Mia Lawson (Joondalup) 4&2, and Adam

Hatch (Royal Fremantle) defeating young Josiah Edwards (Gosnells) 2&1 in their respective finals.

The Men's and Women's Senior
Amateur Championships were played
in April, hosted by Lakelands Country
Club, with Sue Wooster (The National
GC, VIC) dominating the women's field
to win by 11 shots. The Men's was also
won by an interstate visitor, with Ken
Brewer (Newcastle GC, NSW)
triumphing by five shots.

The 2021 WA Open was postponed due to COVID and played in April 2022. Royal Fremantle was the host venue and local amateur Hayden Hopewell came incredibly close to defending his title from 2020. Brayden Becker can thank some final-hole drama as he took out his home state Championship by a single stroke.

Regional Seniors were hosted by Spalding Park in May and had a great turnout with Christine Glanfield (Rockingham) taking home the Britannia Cup.

Next up in June was the Rural Bronze at Riverview Golf Club near Albany. Riverview were excellent hosts with over 100 entries for the 36-hole event. Home favourite Diane Haggerty (Riverview) triumphed by three shots.

Junior tournaments began in July with the Cobra Puma Junior Championship at Kwinana GC. This saw Joseph Buttress (The Western Australian) holding his nerve against Braedon Law (Royal Fremantle) to be crowned the champion boy for the first time. In the Girls' section Valerie Khuu beat Mount Lawley clubmate Amanda Gan on the first playoff hole.

The second week of the July school holidays saw juniors head to the Swan Valley to compete in the Drummond Golf Junior Amateur at The Vines CC. Erina Tan (Mount Lawley), took out the Girl's Championship by two shots over Jorja Hinson-Tolchard (Gosnells).

The Boys' competition was close over the two days, with Ollie Marsh (Royal Fremantle) coming from behind to shoot a two-under second round to secure the win over Josiah Edwards (Gosnells).

July continued with regional events for Women with Denmark CC hosting the Provincial. A two-time winner (2019 & 2021) and local Marion Nelson (Denmark) prevailed as the champion keeping the trophy in the south.

August marked a busy month which was kicked off by the State Amateur Foursomes Championships held at The Vines CC. The 2022 champions, Silvester Tan and Jordan Jung(both from Royal Perth), won by an impressive nine shots. Joondalup's Mia Lawson and Celine Chen combined to win a tight affair over the Mount Lawley duo of Erina Tan and Valerie Khuu by one shot.

The Aglime of Australia State Sand Greens Championship headed south to Augusta. Augusta were fantastic hosts and showed off the picturesque scenery of the southwest. The Championship was shortened from 36 holes to 18 holes due to poor weather on the Saturday. Past winner Rodney Shemeld (Nyabing) claimed the title with a one-shot victory over Jarrad Tenni (Meadow Springs).

The Bowra & O'Dea Women's Classic rounded off August and for the first time was held at Royal Fremantle Golf Club. Plenty of interstate talent made the trip over for the week. Home club player Abbie Teasdale held off the Queensland duo of Hannah Reeves (Brisbane GC) and Rhianna Lewis (Gympie GC) to win by three shots.





October brought about the Drummond Golf 54-hole Junior Classic held at Margaret River GC, Collie GC and Bunbury GC. Both the boys' and girls' events were hotly contested, with Celine Chen (Joondalup) defeating clubmate Mia Lawson by one shot. Josiah Edwards (Gosnells) needed two playoff holes to defeat Ollie Marsh (Royal Fremantle) in what was an exciting finish to the 2022 Junior season.

The GolfWA season, meanwhile, culminated in the 2022 edition of the Nexus Advisernet WA Open. Host venue The Western Australian Golf Club was in spectacular condition and provided fantastic golf and some thrilling low scoring. Victorian Deyen Lawson clinched the title after an exciting backnine battle on the final day, holding off Michael Sim to win by two. It was the first pro title of Lawson's career.

Healthway - Crunch&Sip

2022 was a great opportunity to review our products and activations in our second year of promoting Healthway's Crunch&Sip initiative and full operations post-COVID. The Crunch&Sip message promotes drinking water and eating an extra serve of vegetables or fruit to support good health.

GolfWA delivered MyGolf in Schools, Regional Roadshows, Crunch&Sip Junior Tour this year to accompany the promotion of the Crunch&Sip Healthy Golfer, Junior Stroke Averages and Crunch Club Junior Portal on our website.

2023 is set to be an exciting year for Game Development and Participation growth due to the refinement of the Crunch&Sip Health Promotion Plan in addition to an additional part-time Junior Development Officer. GolfWA were also successful in extending our Healthway support for an additional two years with new activations including the 'Crunch&Sip Hydration Station' at the 2023 WA Open at Joondalup Resort.

MyGolf in Schools

2022 saw another four full school terms of both MyGolf in Schools programs visiting 57 metropolitan schools with 15,560 exposures to golf. Post-program, all schools are provided with information about their local golf club/complex to offer them a pathway to get into golf.

In 2023, GolfWA will continue to run our programs in 'clusters' that share a close

catchment to a local golf club/facility/complex. The goal is to engage the local club/ facility/PGA coaches to build a relationship with this cluster to offer free come-and-try opportunities and a pathway to participation.

In addition to the MyGolf in Schools visits, we have had an extremely successful Sporting Schools drive with a total of 65 schools and 6300 participants who successfully applied and participated in golf coaching sessions.

The government-funded Sporting Schools program provides schools with the opportunity to engage PGA professionals to conduct coaching at a school or golf course. We would like to thank all PGA members and coaches who have supported this initiative in 2022. We hope continued and increasing support of the Sporting Schools program by PGA coaches in 2023 will help us grow the game state-wide and build stronger relationships and easier pathways to transition from school oval to golf course.

We had 69 teachers register as MyGolf School Ambassadors bringing the total to 253 statewide. Increasing this number in 2023 will be critical to help us expose golf to schools further and complement our MyGolf in Schools and Sporting Schools deliveries. We would also like to thank Emma Liebenau for running the ACHPER WA (Australian Council for Health, Physical Education and Recreation in Western Australia) sports expo where she educated 30+ teachers on driving golf programs in schools.



Regional Roadshows

Our Regional Roadshows achieved some positive outcomes in 2022. The roadshows focus on bringing MyGolf in Schools out to the regions in order to offer taster sessions to school students before connecting them with clubs via free Come & Try sessions.

These sessions are also marketed through local radio and social media to offer more exposure and more opportunities for children to try golf, as well as promoting healthy messaging.

The two main focuses in 2022 were to: -

- Build stronger relationships between GolfWA, golf clubs and facilities, schools and local government
- Support clubs to host Come & Try events

Crunch&Sip Junior Tour

The Crunch&Sip GolfWA Junior Tour is now in its 11th year and is a key stepping stone for girls and boys up to the age of 12 who are looking to start playing competition golf. The Junior Tour offers a number of progressive competitions from 5-hole and 9-hole tiger tees through to modified stroke and Stableford. The Junior Tour takes the intimidation out of starting to play, and ensures fun and safety is at the forefront of the experience.

We ran 17 Junior Tour events at a variety of metropolitan and regional courses in 2022, with a total of 950 participants – an average of 56 participants at each event. We had 108 new players participate in 2022, compared to 73 in 2021. We unfortunately had 75+ withdrawals over the course of the year due to COVID symptoms, so the pandemic's impact was still being felt.





In addition to the Junior Tour, we introduced a pilot 'Tiger Tour' program at Collier Park Golf Course where we specifically focused on the 5-hole base level events. This was a great success and created an opportunity to offer short course options for more avid young golfers in addition to supporting public golf courses in getting juniors on the course. We will look to expand this further in 2023 and work with more public courses around the metropolitan region, as well as identifying any regional opportunities where this can be rolled out.

Regional Servicing Grants

In 2022, GolfWA was successful in obtaining a Regional Servicing Grant (RSG) through the Department of Local Government for Sport and Cultural Industries (DLGS&CI). We identified three key pillars of Participation, Talent Development and Club Health to drive and support through a Regional Servicing Plan for the Mid-West, Peel,

South West and Great Southern regions. In its inaugural year we saw a number of successes including: –

- 3 x Community Instructor (CI) practical workshops leading to 18 new accredited CI's
- Come & Try events for children, women only and adults leading to MyGolf and Get Into Golf clinics
- Regional Development Clinics in each region
- Provision of junior equipment to golf clubs to increase capacity for CI's to deliver programs

We would like to thank PGA Coaches
Brayden McCubbing and Michael Draper,
who both delivered informative and
enjoyable Community Instructor
Practical Workshops in both
metropolitan and regional WA.

The RSG grant has been renewed and we look forward to growing our key pillars in our regions further and using 2022 as a benchmark for 2023.

Talent Development Program

Prior to COVID, GolfWA ran 'Junior Ace' development clinics where passionate and developing junior golfers could attend free clinics at GolfWA driven sessions over the course of the year.

In 2022, we tweaked this to create the Talent Development Program (TDP): a two-tiered 'Academy' format with clinics and testing accompanied by off-course seminars on areas including strength and conditioning, psychology, GolfWA and PGA pathways, and game analysis. The program also featured keynote speakers and parents' workshops.

The program required an application with current ability levels and future goals in golf to ensure candidates were committed to developing holistically as golfers. We had 68 applications with 56 selected to be part of a two-tier program. Both Tier 1 and Tier 2 received three training clinics in 2022 with an end-of-year all-day TDP Camp.

In 2023 we are keen to expand this program and, allied with our new High Performance Pathway and Regional Servicing Grant, offer more opportunities to train and develop in decentralised Regional Development Centres.

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High Performance

The GolfWA High Performance (HP) program, like most areas of the golf operations department, resumed an almost full calendar in 2022. This brought about a welcome return for athletes to perform at open amateur events such as Avondale, Riversdale, SA Classic & Rene Erichsen Stroke, Bowra & O'Dea Women's Classic and Mandurah Amateur Open.

We also welcomed back junior amateur events including the Jack Newton International Classic, where we were able to send away eight of our state's best juniors to perform and gain experience at Cypress Lakes, NSW. The whole of Australia also embraced the return of the Interstate Open (May) and Junior (April) Series.

Our Interstate Boys' and Girls' teams performed admirably, with the girls finishing as undefeated champions (4 wins and 1 tie), and the boys finishing in 4th (3 wins, 1 tie and 2 losses). This meant the WA team finished in 2nd place overall, just 0.5pts behind NSW at Mount Osmond Golf Club, South Australia. The performance of note went to WA Junior Captain Amie Phobubpa, who won all five of her matches.

Our Interstate Men's and Women's teams performed well but will collectively be disappointed at not finishing as champions. The men and women both finished 2nd (2 Wins, 2 Ties, 1 Loss each), which resulted in a 3rd place finish overall, 0.5 behind South Australia and 1pt behind champions



Victoria, who defeated WA 4.5 to 3.5 in the final fixture of the event. The performances of note went to Kirsten Rudgeley and Hayden Hopewell, who each won all five of their respective matches.

We would like to congratulate all involved and acknowledge Alex McKay (Coach) and Catherine Strickland (Manager) for their roles at both the Junior and Open Interstate Series. Alex and Catherine have also been selected for the same roles in 2023.

From our HP Athlete Tier Funded program we would like to acknowledge the following athletes who moved on from the program in 2022: –

FINANCE



As stated earlier in this report, the surplus of \$44,988 is a considerable variation against a budgeted deficit of \$233,521. After distribution of net rental and interest on the Labouchere Road Reserve Fund, the surplus was \$25,130 (note 7).

In relation to the financial statements and accompanying notes for 2022, following are the major factors to be noted: –

Income

Affiliation Fee Income - which reflects GolfWA's Affiliation Fee Income plus the nett of Golf Australia Fee and Golflink Fee Income less Golf Australia and Golflink Fee Expense - increased by \$38,670 as a result of the overall increase in membership of 795 (as referenced in the Membership report). Our traditional events showed a slight decrease in

income (note 10), however total Event Income increased by just under \$21K as a result of WA hosting the Australian Masters Games and UniSport Nationals, both of which had golf components for which GolfWA was responsible.

As has already been mentioned, the Nexus Advisernet WA Open was conducted twice in 2022 and with increased prizemoney for both events, as well as the decision to televise the October staging of the tournament on Fox Sports, Kayo and SkyNZ, a combined loss of \$200K was incurred, and thus leading to Total Income decreasing from 2021.

Whilst this is clearly not a sustainable practice, the Board did make the decision to televise the event only several months out and believe that this TV coverage will benefit the promotion of the game in WA and we are also confident that it will generate greater sponsorship for 2023.

FINANCE



Expenditure

With a return to normal operations, Total Expenditure increased by \$254,275 (20%) on 2021, and whilst most line items showed increases, Total Expenditure was under budget by \$277K. Major increases to note: –

- Competition costs increased by 25% on 2021 due to the afore-mentioned Masters and UniSport Nationals, as well as other increased costs.
- With our High Performance athletes being able to travel interstate and overseas in 2022, Travel, Accommodation and associated costs (note 14) increased by \$93,263 in total, with increases in other areas such as Board & Staff travel and Game Development. Notwithstanding, this category was still under budget by \$72K.
- Employment costs (note 17)
 increased by just under \$77K due to
 increased staffing levels and
 contractor costs but was under
 budget by \$122K due to not being at
 full strength the entire year as well as
 budgeting for a potential new
 staffing position that did not
 eventuate.

Balance Sheet

Whilst total Cash Assets (note 2) showed a small increase, of note is the decision by the Board of GolfWA in November to invest \$700K out of Term Deposits into an Investment Fund administered by Integro Private Wealth, in order to generate further income. (The Balance Sheet shows an amount of \$696,297 which is nett of establishment fees – note 2). The Fund has been established on a relatively conservative basis with the objective being to achieve a net return of CPI +2-3% per annum over a 10-year rolling period. An Investment Policy has been established by the Board under

which the Investment Fund must operate, with one of the key parameters being that the Investment Portfolio must consist of approximately 50% defensive assets and 50% growth assets.

In July of 2022, the Board resolved to have our office premises valued as it had been six years since last doing so. That valuation reflected a not unexpected decrease in the valuation of both the Melville Parade offices currently occupied by GolfWA, as well as the office in Labouchere Road that is rented out. These revaluations are shown in note 8 which show a \$245K reduction in value (17.4%).

In terms of Liabilities, the most significant change was an increase in Trade Creditors of \$95,666, being WA Open TV costs and a range of other end-of-year invoices. Income Received in Advance (note 6) increased by just over \$16K.

As a result of the above, the net equity of GolfWA decreased by \$200,011 in 2022. Notwithstanding, the Balance Sheet of GolfWA remains very strong.



1 Statement of Significant Accounting Policies

This financial report is a special purpose financial report prepared in order to satisfy the financial reporting requirements of the Constitution, the Associations Incorporation Act 2015 (WA) and the needs of the Members. The Board has determined that Golf Western Australia (Inc) is not a reporting entity.

The financial report has been prepared on an accruals basis and is based on historic costs and does not take into account changing money values, or except where specifically stated, current valuations of non-current assets

The following specific accounting policies, which are consistent with the previous period unless otherwise stated, have been adopted in the preparation of this financial report.

(a) Income Tax

Golf Western Australia (Inc) is an exempt body for income tax purposes and accordingly no provision for income tax is required.

(b) Revenue

Revenue is recognised in profit or loss when Golf Western Australia (Inc) when it is probable that the economic benefits will flow to the entity, and the amount of the revenue can be measured reliably.

If performance obligations are attached to the revenue which must be satisfied before the entity is eligible to receive the funding, the recognition of revenue will be deferred until those obligations are satisfied.

All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax.

(c) Cash on Hand

Cash includes cash on hand, deposits held at-call with banks, other short-term highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less, and bank overdrafts.

(d) Fixed Assets

Fixed assets are measured on the cost basis and are therefore carried at cost less accumulated depreciation and any accumulated impairment losses.

The depreciable amount of all fixed assets, except buildings, are depreciated over the useful lives of the assets of Golf Western Australia (Inc) commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use. Equipment and consumable items are still depreciable at applicable rates. The assets' residual values and useful lives are reviewed and adjusted, if appropriate, at the end of each reporting period.

Buildings are shown at Market Value. The Buildings were revalued during the current financial year. The difference between the current valuation and carrying value immediately before the valuation, was recognised directly in equity.

(e) Provisions

Provisions are recognised when Golf Western Australia (Inc) has a legal or constructive obligation resulting from past events, for which it is probable that there will be an outflow of economic benefits and that the outflow can be reliably measured. Provisions are measured using the best estimate available of the amounts required to settle the obligation at the end of the reporting period.

A Provision for Long Service Leave is raised in respect of employees with seven or more year's service. Annual Leave is calculated at the legal liability of balance date.

(f) Inventory

Inventory has been valued at the lower of cost or net realisable value. Cost is based on the first in first out principle.
